Title IX Update



Title IX

No person in the United States shall, on the basis of sex, be excluded from participation in, be denied the benefits of, or be subjected to discrimination under any education program or activity receiving Federal financial assistance.



High Points of Title IX History

- 1972: Congress enacts Title IX of the Education Amendments
- 1975: US implements Title IX
- 2011+: Obama administration authors several Dear Colleague letters and other guidance documents
- 2020: Trump administration rescinds previous guidance on transgender students and issues new regulations
- 2021: Biden administration issues new guidance







Scenario One

Several students meet at an off-campus Starbucks for a class study group. Student A makes sexually suggestive comments to Student B through DMs and asks Student B on several dates during study group sessions. Student B repeatedly declines. Student B considers dropping the class because they are so uncomfortable around Student A.



Scenario Two

An adjunct instructor makes comments to Nursing Student A during every clinical rotation that Nursing Student B would be able to calculate doses faster if she were a man. "Everyone knows women are bad at math!" The instructor isn't aware that Nursing Student A is a transgender male.












Behavioral Intervention Team

B. I. T.

Highly Sensitive, Disruptive Issues




The Greenville Technical College Behavioral Intervention Team is a multi-disciplinary group that helps detect early indicators of potential disruptive content, self-harm, and violence to others. The team uses an established protocol to support students, employees, faculty, staff, communities, and workplaces. When the Behavioral Intervention Team receives a report of problematic or concerning behavior, the team determines the best way to support, intervene, and respond. The team then deploys its plan and coordinates a follow-up.

Best Practice Framework



Purpose

Greenville Technical College expects and encourages students to demonstrate a reasonable concern for their own welfare. This is particularly true in the areas of self-harm and harm to others.








Student brought a pet to class.

Training for Faculty



- The Human Side (hands-on caring and concern)
- Go to the Student (classroom, satellite campus, etc.)
- Presentations to Faculty
 - New Faculty Orientation
 - Academic Division Meetings
 - Faculty Senate
 - Management Team

Recognizing a Troubled Student



- Overwhelmed, anxious or stressed
- Breakdown of student's normal coping mechanisms
- Level 1 Not disruptive but counterproductive to self
- Level 2 Reflects significant emotional distress
- Level 3 Student is in obvious crisis

Referring a Distressed Student



- Be simple, direct, firm
- Demonstrate respect
- Caring, non-judgmental
- Undivided attention
- Let the student talk
- Control your emotions
- Give the student a chance to respond

Determining Severity

- Low These behaviors indicate a problem is developing and will likely continue without intervention
- Medium These behaviors should indicate an escalation, and without intervention an incident could occur
- High These behaviors are dangerous and require immediate intervention



Specific recommendations are in place for each level of severity, depending on the behavior situation.

Recordkeeping



- Weekly B.I.T. Meetings
- Discuss students who have caused a disturbance
- Discuss B.I.T. Referrals
- FERPA/Information Release Authorization

Student Removals

- Several options
- Re-enrollment eligibility requirements
- Required documentation
- Required weekly meetings
- GTC counseling staff
- Private mental health provider
- One-year behavior monitoring
- Appeal process



B.I.T. Policies and Procedures



- Procedures for addressing disruptions caused by possible mental health issues
- Procedures for addressing erratic behavior and behavior that disrupts the living and learning environment
